CMAT 2025 Exam Analysis

- Based on the initial reviews of the candidates, the CMAT 2025 examination was relatively easier than the CMAT 2024 examination.
- According to the experts, a score of 360+ in the CMAT examination would fetch the 99 percentile for the candidates in the CMAT examination.
- The overall difficulty of the quantitative aptitude section also lies between the easy to moderate side.

Quantitative Techniques and Data Interpretation

- The Quantitative Aptitude and Data Interpretation section was do-able and slightly easier when compared with the CMAT 2024 question paper.
- The CMAT 2025 question paper's Quantitative Aptitude section focused more on arithmetic.
- Two questions were asked on the topic of time, speed and distance; one involved comparing the speeds of a leopard and a tiger.
- One question was asked from the ratio and proportion topic and two questions were asked from mixtures and alligation.
- The other distribution of the CMAT 2025 slot 1 question paper included 1 question from simple and compound interest and 3 questions from probability.
- A question was asked under the probability section where 20 students were seated around a round table and the probability of A and B sitting together under various conditions. This was a tricky question.
- The data interpretation question was based on a management training institute that offers 5 courses and their placement statistics given in two pie charts in which one corresponded to the percentage of candidates who got placed and the other who did not.
- There was also one question from geometry based on the perimeter of a triangle.
- The overall verdict of the CMAT 2025 question paper's quantitative aptitude section was that it was doable but time-consuming.

Language Comprehension

- One of the major highlights of the CMAT language comprehension section was that there were no lengthy Reading Comprehension questions like those that appear in the CAT, XAT or SNAP examinations.
- 2 para jumble questions and 3-4 sentence correction questions also appeared in the language comprehension section of the CMAT 2025 question paper.
- One another highlight of the language comprehension section of the CMAT 2025 slot 1 question paper was that the synonyms and antonyms were asked in the form of matching the following questions similar to the SNAP examination.
- One language comprehension question required the candidates to understand the type of noun.

- Another language comprehension question asked the candidate to find the type of narrative (first, second or third person) in a passage.
- To conclude, the language comprehension section was of moderate difficulty and is subjective to the preparation level of the candidates. It was of do-able difficulty.

Logical Reasoning

- The logical Reasoning section was also doable in nature.
- In the logical reasoning of the CMAT 2025 slot 1 question paper, the candidates were asked 2 questions from the blood relation topic.
- As expected, the weightage of the critical reasoning questions was high in the CMAT 2025 question paper with 4 -6 questions coming from this section.
- The CMAT 2025 slot 1 question paper also had one question from a series, one question from clocks, and one question on figure counting in which the candidates were supposed to find the number of squares in a figure.

General Awareness

- As expected static GK questions were majorly asked when compared to the current affairs questions in the CMAT 2025 question paper's General Awareness section.
- In the General Awareness section, 2 -3 questions were asked from the current affairs section, 3-4 questions came from the history topic and 3 Geography and Environment questions were asked.
- Overall, according to the expert opinion, a minimum of 7 questions were doable in this section.
- The difficulty level of the general awareness section was also subjective and was based on the preparation level of the candidates.

Innovation and Entrepreneurship

- Statement and reasoning-type questions were asked in the innovation and entrepreneurship section of the CMAT 2025 question paper. These questions demanded the correct application of the candidate's basic business logic.

Questions were asked on topics such as venture capitalists and entrepreneurs.

CMAT 2025 Slot 2 Analysis

The **CMAT 2025 Shift 2** examination, conducted on **January 25, 2025**, received mixed reviews from candidates. According to initial feedback, the overall difficulty level of the exam was rated as **easy to moderate**, with a few variations observed between the two shifts. However, the **exam structure** and **pattern** remained largely unchanged, which ensured consistency between **Shift 1** and **Shift 2**. Here's a detailed breakdown of each section based on student feedback.

Section-wise Difficulty Levels

- **Language Comprehension:** Easy
- **Quantitative Aptitude:** Easy to Moderate
- **Logical Reasoning:** Easy
- **General Awareness:** Moderate
- **Innovation and Entrepreneurship:** Moderate

Verbal Section Analysis

The **Verbal Section** was considered **easy** by most candidates. The questions were direct and straightforward, covering a wide variety of topics. The section primarily tested grammar, vocabulary, and reading comprehension skills. On average, students attempted around **20 to 25 questions** in this section, with a high accuracy rate. Some of the most common topics that appeared in the verbal section included:

- **Direct and Indirect Speech:** Questions related to transforming sentences between direct and indirect speech, which were considered easy by most students.
- **Idioms and Phrases:** A set of questions that required candidates to match idioms with their meanings. This was presented in a **match-the-columns** format, making it a relatively easy task for students familiar with common idiomatic expressions.
- **Reading Comprehension:** The passage was based on understanding the **perspective of the writer**, which was relatively easy for students who practiced regularly.
- **Grammar-based Questions:** Multiple-choice questions focused on sentence structure, tense usage, and parts of speech.
- **Types of Sentences:** Questions that tested knowledge of **simple** and **compound** sentences.
- **Active and Passive Voice:** Students had to transform sentences from active to passive and vice versa.
- **Para Jumbles:** These questions tested the ability to arrange sentences in the correct order to form a coherent paragraph.
- **Statement-based Questions:** These included questions where candidates had to determine the truthfulness of a given statement.
- **Choose the Odd One Out:** A few questions asked candidates to identify the word or phrase that did not belong to a given set.

This section was relatively easy for those who had a strong grasp of grammar rules and basic vocabulary, making it one of the less challenging areas of the exam.

Quantitative Aptitude Analysis

The **Quantitative Aptitude** section was described as **moderate** by many candidates. While a few questions were straightforward, others were more complex and required careful time management. The section included a mix of topics such as **Profit and Loss**, **Compound Interest**, **Simplification**, and **Ratio and Proportion**. Notably, some students found the **Ratio and Proportion** questions to be quite lengthy.

- **Profit and Loss:** This area had one relatively lengthy question, requiring multiple steps to solve, which students found to be time-consuming but manageable if approached systematically.
- **Compound Interest:** Another challenging problem that required candidates to apply the compound interest formula correctly. The question had a complex structure, adding to its difficulty.
- **Simplification:** This question was presented in the **match-the-following** format, where candidates had to match equations with their simplified results. Most students found this part easy, as it was more about applying basic arithmetic principles.
- **Ratio and Proportion:** This topic included some of the lengthiest questions in the paper. Students needed to apply the correct formulas and methods to solve these questions, making them time-consuming for many.

Despite the moderate level of difficulty, candidates who had practiced enough and managed their time well were able to navigate this section successfully.

Logical Reasoning Analysis

The **Logical Reasoning** section was considered **easy** by most students. The questions were designed to test general reasoning skills, and they were straightforward in nature. Some of the most common question types in this section included:

- **Venn Diagram:** One question tested the ability to interpret relationships between sets using a Venn diagram.
- **Seating Arrangement:** Another question asked candidates to arrange individuals in a particular order based on given conditions.
- **Coding-Decoding:** One question required candidates to decipher a coded message based on a certain pattern.
- **Analogy:** A set of **three questions** appeared in this section, where candidates had to identify the relationship between pairs of words or symbols.

Candidates who had practiced reasoning puzzles and understood basic logical concepts found this section relatively easier compared to the other sections.

General Awareness Analysis

The **General Awareness** section proved to be a bit tricky and was rated as **moderate** by most students. The section covered a variety of topics, including current affairs, political knowledge, and static general knowledge. Students found that a significant number of questions were based on **political** topics, especially focusing on India's electoral system, which made this section more challenging. Some of the prominent topics covered included:

- **Election-related Knowledge:** A question about the name of the **Election Commissioner of India** (Rajiv Kumar) was asked, and many students found such questions relatively easy to recall if they kept up with current affairs.
- **Famous Places:** A question asked about the **Golden Temple**, testing knowledge of historical and cultural landmarks.
- **Freedom Fighters:** Some questions tested knowledge about prominent freedom fighters and their contributions to India's independence.
- **Folk Dances:** A few questions covered different **folk dances** of India, which were tricky for students who didn't have detailed knowledge of the subject.
- **Committees and Banks:** Questions about various **committees** and their roles, as well as questions about **banks and their headquarters**, were included.
- **Founders of National Parties:** A question was asked about the founder of the **Congress Party**, which some students found easy, while others struggled to recall.

While around 10-12 questions were relatively easy for most students, the overall difficulty of this section was higher compared to the others.

Innovation and Entrepreneurship Analysis

The **Innovation and Entrepreneurship** section was rated as **moderate**. It tested the candidates' understanding of basic entrepreneurial concepts, including business strategies, innovative practices, and economic factors. Students who had a general understanding of **business** and **entrepreneurship** fared better in this section. However, some of the questions required deeper insights, making it moderately challenging for others.

Student Feedback

Many students reported that **Shift 2** was slightly **more difficult** than **Shift 1**. While the **Language Comprehension**, **Quantitative Aptitude**, and **Logical Reasoning** sections were relatively easier, students found the **General Awareness** and **Innovation & Entrepreneurship** sections to be more challenging. The difficulty level in these sections was higher, requiring more focus and careful answering. Overall, students felt that the exam was balanced but slightly tilted towards a moderate difficulty.

On average, students attempted between **65 to 75 questions**, depending on their individual strengths and time management skills.

Expected Cutoff

Based on the initial student feedback and the overall difficulty level of the paper, the **cutoff scores** for **CMAT 2025 Shift 2** are expected to be slightly **higher** than those of previous years. This is mainly due to the relatively easy nature of the **Language Comprehension**, **Quantitative Aptitude**, and **Logical Reasoning** sections, which will likely lead to higher overall attempts and better performance.

Conclusion

CMAT 2025 Shift 2 maintained its **overall structure** and **balance**, while slightly increasing the challenge in the **General Awareness** and **Innovation & Entrepreneurship** sections. Candidates who performed well in the **easier sections** and managed to attempt a good number of **General Awareness** questions are expected to score higher in this shift. The exam continued to test a wide range of topics, ensuring that candidates were assessed on their overall proficiency across different subjects.

1. Where is the Wankhede Stadium located?

Wankhede Stadium is located in Mumbai, Maharashtra. It is a renowned cricket stadium that has hosted numerous international matches, including the 2011 ICC Cricket World Cup Final, where India won the championship. It is one of India's most famous cricket venues.

2. Where will the 2028 Olympics be held?

The relationship between "Chair" and "Furniture" is that a chair is a type of furniture. Similarly, "Shoes" are a type of "Footwear," making "Footwear" the correct answer.

7. A clock is set right at 8 AM. This clock gains 10 minutes in 24 hours. What is the true time when the clock indicates 11 AM?

Solution:

The clock gains 10 minutes in 24 hours. This means the clock gains $10 \div 24 = 5/12$ minutes per hour.

From 8 AM to 11 AM, 3 hours have passed according to the faulty clock.

The total time gained by the faulty clock in 3 hours is:

Time gained = $3 \times (5/12) = 15/12 = 1.25$ minutes (1 minute and 15 seconds).

The actual time passed is less than 3 hours by 1.25 minutes.

Subtracting 1.25 minutes from 11:00 AM, we get the true time:

True time = 11:00 - 1.25 minutes = 10:58:45 (approximately 10:59 AM).
